### **Low Water Level Advisory**

When flow rate reaches 1.7 m<sup>3</sup>/s, the Town will issue a restriction on water use for the following outside activities:

- Sprinkling, watering or irrigating of shrubbery, trees, lawns, grass, plants, vegetables, flowers, etc;
- Filling or topping of pools;
- Washing of motor vehicles;

The Town will notify residents and commercial users via radio communication and social media;

- Operating staff will continually monitor water levels and flow rates as per the latest Nova Scotia Environment permit;
- Water restrictions will remain in effect until water levels and flow rates return to an acceptable level as dictated by Nova Scotia Environment;
- The general public will be informed via social media and radio when the water restrictions are lifted.

### STAGE 1: ALTERNATE DAY WATER USE

When the East River flow reaches 1.7 m<sup>3</sup>/s the Town will give notice that a reduction in water use is necessary requiring Stage 1 restrictions. The following activities are restricted:

- Sprinkling, watering or irrigating of shrubbery, trees, lawns, grass, plants, vegetables, flowers, etc;
- Filling or topping of pools;
- Washing of motor vehicles;

The above uses are restricted to the following:

- Even numbered addresses are permitted on even calendar days (2nd, 4th, 6th, etc) from 6am to 11am and 7 pm to midnight;
- Odd numbered addresses are permitted on odd calendar days (1st, 3rd, 5th, etc) from 6am to 11am and 7pm to midnight;

### STAGE 2: TWICE A WEEK WATER USE

When the East River flow reaches 1.5 m<sup>3</sup>/s the Town will give notice that a reduction in water use is necessary requiring Stage 2 restrictions. The following activities are restricted:

- Sprinkling, watering or irrigating of shrubbery, trees, lawns, grass, plants, vegetables, flowers, etc;
- Filling or topping of pools;
- Washing of motor vehicles;

The above uses are restricted to the following:

- Even numbered addresses are permitted on Saturdays and Tuesdays from 6am to 11am and 7 pm to midnight;
- Odd numbered addresses are permitted on Sundays and Wednesdays from 6am to 11am and 7pm to midnight;


### STAGE 3: NO OUTDOOR WATER USE


When the East River flow reaches 1.4 m<sup>3</sup>/s the Town will give notice that a reduction in water use is necessary requiring Stage 3 restrictions. And the following shall apply:

- No person shall use water supplied by the Town for other than a domestic purpose or commercial purpose. No person shall use water outdoors for any purpose.


